Dear Parents and Carers



The government have announced their intention to move to Step 4 on July 19th, meaning that social distancing measures will cease, and the country can begin its road back to normality.

The opportunity to revert back to our familiar routine is welcomed, but we have decided to continue with our current rules and routines during the last 5 days of term. The three key reasons for this are:

- 1. Covid is still prevalent, and the Delta variant has been identified in some of our feeder secondary schools.
- 2. There are staff members on site who are medically vulnerable and some who have not had their second vaccination yet.
- 3. Test and trace will not end until the 16th August. This means that if anyone tests positive at our school during the last week of term, plus the 48 hours after we break up for the summer holiday, close contacts will be notified and will be required to self-isolate for 10 days. This may have consequences for families and their summer plans. We would like to reduce this risk as much as possible.

Face masks remain a polite request outside of the school grounds when collecting, but I appreciate that this is beyond the control of the school. Social distancing is the most effective way to manage the spread of the virus; please consider this when collecting your children as we have many vulnerable families who still need to be protected.

We aim to relax these rules in September, and we will wait for the government updates at the end of August before sharing our return to school routines with you.

OOSC and After-School Curriculum Clubs Survey results

Wraparound Care and Curriculum After-School Clubs Consultation – Update from Mrs Marwood



In June 2021, we invited all our families to take part in a consultation on Survey Monkey about our Pippins Breakfast Club, Orchard Out of School Club and curriculum-based after-school clubs. We had a fair response so thank you to the 11 families who responded and shared their views.

We understand that wraparound care is important to our families and can be a key factor in selecting a school. As a federation, we endeavour to offer wraparound care at the most reasonable cost to families, ensuring that it does not impact significantly on the school budget. The biggest element of the cost to consider is staffing costs - an increase in the minimum wage, national insurance and pension contributions over the last two years has been absorbed by the school rather than adding an increase onto the price of the childcare. It goes without saying that the more families that use the service, the more cost effective it is and we can then pass these savings onto our families when considering future pricing structure.

The majority of families found the start time and price of Breakfast Club met their needs. Some thought Breakfast Club was expensive – we need three children to attend each day to break even financially and most days, we only have one or two children. We would be able to be more competitive on price should more families use the service. A couple of families did express interest in a 7.45am start and I would be grateful if those families would contact Mrs Obridge, if they haven't done already, so we can better understand the number of children involved and what year groups they are in. We can then consider whether this is feasible with the staff members we have in school and financially viable at this time.

With regard to Orchard Out of School Club, we are in a similar financial position. Very few families use the service, so the pricing structure is calculated to try and recoup the cost to run the service. We are hopeful that more families will use the club in September, following the responses in the survey. We can then look to review the price per session and consider a reduction for siblings. The club runs from 3.15pm to 5.15pm, although we will consider a later collection time to 5.30pm if this is pre-booked.

We have had some nursery parents who have expressed a need for Out of School Club from September. If you haven't already, please can I ask you to contact Mrs Obridge in the office with the pattern of days needed. We can then consider how we can help you.

There was an overwhelmingly positive response about Curriculum-based after school clubs until 4.30pm. We are making plans for these to restart the second week back in September and for them to be a success, we need as many families as possible to support the clubs. The cost suggestion of ± 3.00 to ± 3.50 was agreeable to most, with Cookery Club pricing at ± 4.00 to meet the cost of staffing and ingredients. There will be a range of clubs across the academic year – we cannot cater for all year groups in the first half-term so the plan across the year will reflect a balanced approach for all as much as possible.

More information about how to make an after-school booking, on a 'first come, first paid' basis, will be available before the end of July. Refunds will be offered where we cannot meet the staffing requirements of the club.

Message from NYSCP:

As a federation we encourage safe internet and social media use. It has been advised by the local authority, that we share the following information with our families.



REPORT REMOVE – is a new tool to empower children and young people to stop the spread of nude images online.

North Yorkshire Safeguarding Children Partnership (NYSCP) is promoting the new Childline and Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) tool which helps children and young people to report a nude image or video of themselves that has been shared online.

The IWF can then take steps to remove it from the Internet. Given recent Ofsted reports and research from many other organisations, we know there are many reasons for taking/sharing and equally many barriers to reporting images and videos. It is therefore imperative that young people know that they can take action themselves and that something will be done.

Importantly, a young person can even report an image/video that hasn't been uploaded and shared. The IWF will assign a 'hash' (a digital fingerprint) to prevent the image being uploaded by anyone. More information from the IWF can be found following this link:

Housekeeping

Drinks in school

It is essential with the current period of hot water that children please bring in a water bottle daily. These can be refilled throughout the day at our plumbed-in water station. Please only send in water and **not** juice etc, as this goes against our Healthy School's policy which can be found on the school website:

Fresh, chilled drinking water is available for all pupils throughout the day and pupils will be encouraged to drink water at frequent intervals. All packed lunch pupils have access to water at lunch time meaning there is no need for an additional drink to be brought as part of a packed lunch. Pupils are encouraged to bring a water bottle every day that they can refill, as necessary.



Bottles go home at the end of every day to be washed and returned. Covid restrictions – pupils should bring in their own named water bottle from home and this will be sent home every night.

No drinks other than water will be brought into school by pupils unless recommended by a doctor for medical needs.



PE Lessons

A reminder that **Class 1**, **Class 2** and **Class 3's** PE lessons are all held on <u>Thursdays</u>. Children should come to school dressed in their PE kit and remain in their kit all day, rather than change. Please ensure that your child has appropriate clothing for the changes in weather.



Pupil absences: it is really important that you please make sure you telephone or email the school before 9.15am to notify us of any child absence, with a reason for their absence. Equally, we ask if your child is unwell and you have called on the first day of their absence, we also require a call on each subsequent day until they are well enough to be back in school. If we do not receive any communication, by phone or email, we start our process of contacting all of the contacts allocated to your child and if we still haven't received any information, the Children Missing in Education protocol is triggered. Thank you for your cooperation with this.

Medicines in school



If you require your child to have medicine administered during a school day, please complete a 'Parental Request for Medicine in School' form, which is available from the School Office. We are not allowed to administer any medicine without this being completed fully and signed by a parent/carer and the Headteacher/Head of School. If your child requires a course of antibiotics for example, over a period of

a few days, please ensure that the medicine is handed directly into the School Office each morning. Whilst we can administer Calpol (or similar Paracetamol-based medicines), we are not insured to administer any Ibuprofen medication sent in, unless this is prescribed by a doctor.

OOSC - Pippins and Orchard Club drop-offs and collections



We do have places available for our after-school provision – please contact us with any provision you may require.

For Pippins Breakfast Club, you do not need to book ahead and Mrs Wilson opens the main School Reception door at 8am. We cannot permit children onto the premises before this

time, due to insurance restrictions. <u>Children must be brought to the door by an adult and handed over to a</u> <u>member of staff; please do not park on the road and allow your child to enter the school grounds by themselves.</u>

And for the Orchard After-School club, please knock or ring the OOSC doorbell and your children will be brought to the main school Reception door by Miss Gamble or Mrs Laycock, to be collected and signed out by Parents/Carers by **5.30pm**.

All payments are added to ParentPay within the same week.



Outstanding ParentPay debts

Please could parents and carers ensure that any outstanding ParentPay debts are cleared regularly. Across the federation, there is an agreed maximum debt per child, which is £30.00. This includes any nursery fees, school dinners and out of school club payments. Please keep an eye on your child's account and make payment as soon as possible, thank you.
